

Although I am a "smart phone" user, I am forever amazed at their prevalence in society today.

Keep in mind that a smart phone is: "a mobile phone built on a mobile operating system, with more advanced computing capability and connectivity than a "plain" cell phone." The first smartphones combined the functions of a personal digital assistant (PDA) with a mobile phone. I had been a devout Palm Pilot users and when they were discontinued, I had to start considering moving from my *cell phone* to a *smart phone*.

Then the features of media players, digital cameras, video cameras, and GPS navigation units were added to form one multi-use device. Most smartphones also include high-resolution touchscreens and web browsers to display web pages using high-speed data access provided by Wi-Fi and mobile broadband.

More recently, the rapid development of mobile apps have made Smart Phones so much more useful that it is hard to resist their appeal. This is much more than the flip phone that just makes phone calls without going out on the internet.

The cell phone is by far — and across all generations — the most popular technology device in America. Research shows that 85% of adults own a cell phone. By comparison, 59% of adults own a desktop computer, 52% own a laptop computer, 57% own an iPod or mp3 player and 5% own an e-book reader. Almost all adults ages 65 and younger own a cell phone, as do two-thirds (68%) of adults ages 66 to 74 and nearly half (48%) of adults ages 75 and older. Still, adults younger than age 34 continue to be on the cutting edge of this technology taking advantage of the many incredible features while most older cell phone owners use only two of the main non-voice functions on their phones: taking pictures and text messaging.

Another effect of the wide use of cell phones is that a quarter of people now turn to their mobile phone to check the time, ignoring the traditional wristwatch. And among the under-35s, the number relying on digital devices for timekeeping is even higher, reported at four in ten. Watch sales have been hurt!

The use of cell phones has also had a huge impact on the sale of digital cameras. From a picture-taking point of view, this year consumers in North America will shoot 75 billion pictures with a digital camera and 42 billion with a camera phone, according to Lyra Research last year.



Library and Archives Canada Announces a Huge Digitization Project



A huge new project has been announced by Library and Archives Canada and by Canadiana.org to digitize millions of documents of historical importance. The digitized documents apparently will not be available on the World Wide Web. The announcement states that the documents will be available at Library and Archives Canada and at "a Canada-wide network of public and research libraries..."

The following announcement was written by:

Library and Archives Canada and Canadiana.org partner on digitization, online publication of millions of images from archival microfilm collection Library and Archives Canada (LAC) and <u>Canadiana.org</u> have strengthened their long-standing partnership to considerably increase access to Canada's documentary heritage by way of a large-scale digitization partnership involving about 60 million images from numerous collections. Over the coming years, this partnership will triple LAC's digital content on the Web, and allow Canadians to access tens of millions of additional images regardless of where they live, at no charge.

Canadiana.org is a not-for-profit charitable organization dedicated to building Canada's digital preservation infrastructure and providing the broadest possible access to Canadian documentary heritage. Members of Canadiana.org include a Canada-wide network of public and research libraries that share tools and capacity, lead innovative openaccess initiatives, and plan the future of digital preservation in Canada.

LAC's 10-year agreement with this longstanding partner covers the digitization, indexing and description of millions of personal, administrative and government documents, as well as land grants, war diaries and photographs. There will be no change for those Canadians who wish to access these collections at LAC.

Canadiana.org also will also transcribe millions of handwritten pages, and create related descriptions. Enhanced search tools facilitating access to these records will be available to Canadians free of charge at LAC, as well as at hundreds of subscribing libraries in regions across Canada. For a small monthly fee, Canadians will also be able to use the enhanced tools online to conduct advanced searches without leaving home.

Win 8 Mail Won't ^{Soffice tips} Support POP, What To Do?

Beverly Williams from United States writes:

I currently have used my email address with Time Warner Roadrunner many, many years. After buying a Win 8 laptop I find MS won't support pop servers accounts. RR told me MS hasn't told them how to configure their email and to access it through the web which is slow and few options that Windows Mail used to provide. I looked into buying MS Outlook, over \$100, but even then think it won't support my accessing Roadrunner through it. What's the best option for me?



Answer:

You've run into a problem that many users of the Mail app in Windows 8 have, Microsoft discontinued support for older style POP mail accounts. The good news is, there are a few ways you can work around this problem.

Switch POP3 to IMAP: IMAP is a server protocol for e-mail, where the e-mails are saved and stored on the server and your client (ex: Windows Mail, Outlook) just checks and syncs the information. IMAP is considered a better system then POP3, since all e-mail is saved on the server so multiple devices can check the same e-mail box. If you contact your internet service provider they may offer IMAP and have instructions on how to check your e-mail using IMAP.

Stand Alone E-mail Client: Another option is to use a stand alone e-mail client like Mozilla Thunderbird or Microsoft Outlook. These e-mail clients support POP3 and in the case of Mozilla Thunderbird can be downloaded free of charge by **clicking here**^[1].

Use Fetcher in GMail: A popular choice among free e-mail providers, Gmail by Google, can check POP3 accounts and automatically download the e-mail into your g-mail account. This tool, called Fetcher, can be enabled for free on any Gmail account. **Click here** ^[2] to read the directions on how to use Fetcher.

P.S. You may also want to consider switching off your ISP's e-mail all together. The problem with using the service providers e-mail address, is if you change providers, move or cancel your account you, lose all of your e-mail. A third-party free provider (Gmail, Outlook.com, Yahoo Mail etc) solves this problem and lets you keep one consistent e-mail address.

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Scheduling CCleaner

CCleaner is a useful and powerful system-cleaning tool that can help recover disk space as well as clear general clutter. It can be run manually, but in this article, I'll show you how to set it up to run once a week automatically.

It's no secret that crap (pardon the language) piles up on our computers over time. Temporary files that don't get cleaned up properly, assorted caches, histories, and backups of files that we might never need all seem to accumulate and can even negatively impact performance.

I use the word "crap" here specifically, because that's what that initial "C" in CCleaner originally represented – "Crap Cleaner."

Regardless of the political correctness of its name, then or now, CCleaner is a useful tool in managing the accumulation of "stuff" on your computer that might be doing nothing more than wasting space.

In the past, we've focused on running CCleaner as needed to clean things up when we think of it or encounter a problem.

The beauty of computers is that they're very good at doing things automatically. That includes not only creating crap, but cleaning it up as well.


Backup first

I wouldn't be me if I didn't remind you to back up your machine before you run CCleaner, or any cleaning tool, particularly for the first time.

While it's rare for CCleaner to actually break anything, you may realize after a cleaning that you cleaned something you didn't want to lose. A restore to a full backup image can quickly help you recover from that, so that you can then adjust the CCleaner settings and move on.

Run CCleaner and choose settings

If you haven't already, download CCleaner (making sure to select the free version), install it, and then run it.



CCleaner does require administrative access to run. It will clean up areas on the machine that are system controlled and thus require administrative privileges. Spend a few minutes examining the items listed in CCleaner's "Cleaner" section:

Make sure to scroll through the entire Windows tab for components included with Windows and the Applications tab for applications that CCleaner knows how to clean.

Select only those items that you want to have automatically cleaned up on a regular schedule. I'll discuss some of the implications below, but the important thing to realize here is that whatever you select will be automatically removed without your involvement on each automated run of CCleaner.

After selecting what you want cleaned, go ahead and run an analysis:

In fact, you might even want to run an actual cleaning to make sure that the result are as you expect them to be.

Once you're satisfied, click the **Options** icon, then the **Ad-vanced** button, and make sure that "Save all settings to INI file" is checked:



This causes all of the options that you've selected to be written to an .ini file for use by CCleaner when it is run automatically.

Important: If you later run CCleaner and change any settings while this checkbox is checked, you will be changing the settings for the automated run as well.

Close CCleaner. It's time to schedule things.

Schedule the cleaning

In Control Panel, click Administrative Tools, double-click Task Scheduler, and in Task Scheduler, click Task Scheduler Library (on the left):



As you can see, this will list a number of pre-existing scheduled tasks.

Click Create Basic Task... on the right.

Windows 8 Hacks

Windows 8 Hacks is a nifty little task-oriented volume. It is not an overview or introductory text to Microsoft's latest Operating System. And granted, much of what is contained within these pages can be found online. However, I fall into the category of not knowing enough about Windows 8 and its underpinnings to know what to ask the Great Google to fetch for me. So I looked through this book and thought it would be a great instructional guide to learning the ins and outs of customizing this OS. As I continued to browse, I noticed some of the hacks I was interested in require Windows 8 Pro or Enterprise to be installed on my machine. Microsoft has eliminated many of the command-line utilities we all love to use to get "under the hood" in a new computer's edition of the OS that's installed by default. Sadly, even the first hack, Disable Windows 8's Lock Screen, just won't work for me because gpedit.msc is not accessible on my new laptop. I feel as if I just bought a cripple-ware computer! But enough whining.

This book contains an abundance of useful step-by-steps for making Windows 8 more efficient for you. Even more important, there are great explanations of how the particular subject of the hack works. For example, Hack 70: Hack DNS to Speed up Web browsing (a way to speed up your web browsing using any type of connection). This hack has a succinct explanation of the Domain Name System and how to implement the free OpenDNS service on your computer and/or entire network. It's simply a matter of changing the DNS addresses in Internet Protocols on your PC or router. Windows 8 Keyboard Shortcuts are listed nicely in a table in Hack 38.

This is really handy for us non-touchscreen users. Using the keyboard for direct access to features is so much more efficient than pointing at corners of the screen and then click-click-click. Hack 39 is a table of Windows 8 Gestures. Hack 44 is all about SkyDrive, what it is, how to use it, and why you should download SkyDrive for Windows (not the one preinstalled) to gain full functionality.

I surely miss the Start Menu. I hear I am far from alone in this complaint. Hack 8 explains how to create a folder that contains a complete listing of all your installed applications, including the system apps and Win8 apps.

Pin it to the start menu and drag it into an accessible spot. Double-click the folder to see the complete list and use the new File Explorer search bar to find anything quickly. Hack 85 contains instructions for accessing the Win8 secret administrator account. This account is not subject to the UAC controls. Think super-user or root on Linux systems.

So once you figure out how to get past your start screen, you'll find Preston Gralla's book a great asset in modifying

or optimizing everything Windows 8. From startup and desktop to networking and security to e-mail, hardware and the registry, every aspect of the OS is touched upon.

While the title uses the term Hacks, I consider them 121 gems of hidden keys to opening up the potential of Win 8.



The argument is "/auto", which tells CCleaner not to bother displaying its user interface, but get right to cleaning when it's run. Click **Next**.

As we saw when we started CCleaner manually, it needs administrative access. Make sure that "Run with highest privileges" is checked to enable that for the scheduled task. (You might also want to change the "Run only when user is logged on" setting.)

Click **OK**. Close all the windows and you have your weekly scheduled CCleaner cleaning.

The implications of automated cleaning

When you run CCleaner or any cleaning tool manually, you'll expect that certain things will be removed. That's the point, after all. When cleaning happens automatically, it's easy to forget and you'll sometimes be surprised when something goes missing.

With the schedule put into place above, CCleaner will run silently once a week and clean things up. That means that after the CCleaner run:

You'll be logged out of all the sites that relied on cookies to

keep you logged in if you allow CCleaner to clear cookies. You'll simply need to re-login to those sites as you visit them again.

You won't find any deleted documents in your recycle bin, if you've allowed CCleaner to empty it.

You'll find that some conveniently remembered bits of information in various programs (for example, recently typed URLS in IE) may have been forgotten, if you allowed CCleaner to clean them.

The first few page fetches in your browser might take a little longer as it has to rebuild the cache if you let CCleaner clean it.

And so on...

You get the idea. CCleaner is great at cleaning things up. You'll just want to make sure that they are things you actually do want to have cleaned up – particularly once you allow the process to happen automatically.



Taxing Times: Steer Clear of the New IRS Scams

It didn't take long for criminals to come up with new IRS scams to cash in on the government's \$170 billion stimulus package with tax refunds to boost the economy.

Even before Congress signed off on the proposal, tax scammers were phoning people, asking for their bank details so the IRS could supposedly deposit refunds directly into their accounts.

They bait their victims by suggesting this will mean a faster than expected refund, and they sometimes warn that if you don't give the information immediately, you could lose your refund.

This IRS scam enables con artists to get bank account and Social Security numbers, as well as credit and debit card details that they then use for identity theft.

In fact, as we've said before, the Internal Revenue Service never, repeat never, asks for taxpayers' personal information over the phone -- or in emails. That's not how it does business.

Even before this scam began, police were warning about the rash of IRS scams that appear at this time of year, mostly aimed at identity theft, taking control of PCs or simply duping people out of cash.

Most of today's tax scams are variations on the themes we've been seeing over the past few years. You can catch up on some of these here.

"You're Under Investigation": A New IRS Email Scam How to Recognize and Avoid the IRS Audit Scam NEW IRS Notice is Really a Phishing Scam Tax Scams: What You Really Need to Watch Out for

Four Currently Hot IRS Scams:

1. In a new IRS scam aimed at seniors, the fakers tell the victim they can get his or her Social Security payroll taxes refunded for an upfront fee based on the size of the <u>rebate</u>, plus a percentage of the refund.

Naturally, they say it will be a big refund and inflate their "fee" to match it, producing and filling in a tax form as "evidence."

Trouble follows: The law doesn't allow a refund of taxes paid into Social Security and the taxpayer may end up having to pay penalties for filing a fraudulent return.

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2. A "we owe you money" email seemingly comes from the Internal Revenue Service. The subject line reads something like "Tax notification" or "2007 fiscal activity refund" and invites you to click on a link that takes you to a convincing-looking IRS website.

But the site is an IRS scam, which as usual, asks for personal details. It can be quickly identified as fake. It has the same links as IRS pages, but when you click on them, the page simply refreshes instead of taking you to the link.

And the bottom line again: The IRS does NOT send out refunds this way. If the IRS wants to get in touch, it sends a letter. The only way it collects your bank account details is if you choose to put them in your tax return. Period.

3. Instead of claiming the IRS owes you money, another tax scam offers a <u>reward</u> to you for filing your return early. Again, a phone caller will ask for bank details.

Not only does the IRS not seek such details by phone -but it also doesn't pay rewards for early returns!

4. Another sneaky trick is an email that offers taxpayers \$80 for filling an online customer satisfaction survey. Of course, you're expected to enter all your personal details on the form. Don't fall for this -- it's a scam.

There are lots more IRS scams -- more than 1,000 at the last count!

How to Spot an IRS Scam

IRS scammers try to convince you that their call or email is genuine in a number of ways. Here are some of the tricks they use to try to fool you:

1. They invent a refund sum that sounds convincing -not too big and not too round. Something like \$134.80 sounds legit, doesn't it?

Here's an example making the rounds at the moment (all it would bring you, if you clicked the link, is a piece of spyware that installs on your computer).

- 2. They use forms with numbers similar to those the IRS already uses; with a jumble of numbers and letters, they just sound right. However, they are not.
- 3. They use the official IRS logo and, very often, copy whole sections of text from the IRS's website.

4. They use real names and copied signatures of senior IRS people, most recently the Director of IRS Exempt Organizations, or names of genuine independent groups like the Taxpayer Advocate Service.

The lesson is: Just because something looks official doesn't mean it is.

Nonetheless, it's easy to sidestep these tax scams if you just remember these few simple rules -- in addition to the ones mentioned above -- about how the IRS operates:

•Remember that the only genuine IRS website is <u>www.irs.gov</u>. If any link takes you to a page that isn't on this site, then you are not visiting the IRS website.

(You should only type <u>www.irs.gov</u> into your browser yourself and not get there by clicking a link.)

•The only emails the IRS sends out concern general newsletters, events and that sort of thing. It never asks for financial information or discusses anything related to individual tax accounts by email.

•The IRS never asks for PIN numbers, passwords or other confidential information for any reason or by any method -- not even face-to-face.

•Tax refunds are claimed through filing an annual tax return, not a separate application form.

One final warning for the tax season: **Beware of advance refund loans**: organizations offering to loan you the money you're expecting to get as a tax refund this year.

Although they may be perfectly legit, many lenders charge huge rates of interest, plus administration fees, processing fees, and so on. You are basically paying through the nose to borrow your own money.

Sending your return in on time will sometimes get you your money in just a few weeks -- without this hefty penalty. After all, you've worked for it, so make the most of it!

So, it's easy to avoid these IRS scams -- just a little knowledge and attention can do wonders.

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Got Windows 8? Then get Start8

Some reviews of Microsoft's Windows 8 have been brutal. I have been using Windows 8 since December 2012. It is on a desktop and does not have a touch screen. It works well. I have not experienced a crash to date.

Overall, I do like Windows 8. Do I prefer it to Windows 7 or XP? Yes, I do! That is a powerful statement. Here is why.

Windows 8, like Windows 7 is pleasant to use. I find it overall to be aesthetic in appearance. It is like having two operating systems. The so called Metro-Modern Start Screen consists of blocks that contain your programs. There is no START BUTTON like in previous Windows versions. This look was made to conform to hand-held devices like phones and tablets. These devices use touch screens and this layout works. However, when using a traditional Windows 7 desktop, it almost becomes useless. There is no point to have it other than to remain consistent in appearance between handheld devices and your desktop or laptop. Microsoft made one of these Metro-Modern Start Screen program blocks to access the good old traditional desktop of by gone Windows versions. EXCEPT, there is no START button like previous versions of Windows.

Some of the apps that are made for the Metro-Modern look may work different that you would expect on a laptop or desktop application. For instance, Internet Explorer 10 when in the Metro-Modern mode will be in a minimalist mode. You will not have the full robust appearance that you would be used to having if launched from a Windows 7 desktop. However, Microsoft did include the full version of Internet Explorer 10 in the Windows 8 desktop. Sounds confusing. It is, until you become accustomed to this. However, this difference really is not great. You can choose to stay in the familiar traditional Desktop mode that looks like Windows 7 and not visit the Metro-Modern Start Screen very much.

However, one great issue exists. This single issue may be the problem as to why Windows 8 has not been too successful. The START Button at the lower left corner of your screen is missing. Microsoft purposely left this button out. So if you use Windows XP, Vista or 7, you are familiar with the Start button and rely on it for just about everything you do. Picture it gone. Now you see the problem.

It is this anomaly that may have caused the negative reviews and caused slow sales of Windows 8. So Microsoft, wake up and give us that START BUTTON back. Until Microsoft does include the Start Button, here comes a company that has been around for thirty years. It is Stardock. This company created a program called START8. The purpose of this program is to put the good old Start Button back on the Windows 8 Desktop screen and function as before.

START8 costs a mere \$4.99. To me this is a bargain. Lets take a look at this START8. You need to download it from www.stardock.com. Then install it. Simple and done. You can customize this START. You can choose a STYLE. It can be the traditional Windows 7 theme or custom to your preference. You may choose a Windows 8 style. You may have translucency, flag look START button or customize.

You also can choose, Large Icons, Show Recently used applications, Open sub Menus, create shortcuts, show Windows 8 Modern User Interface, control some Window 8 features – on and on.

That is about all it does. It is cheap and works well. This is one of those programs that is so obvious. In fact, this one program may actually increase sales of Windows 8.

I recommend this to anyone that uses Windows 8. Thank You Stardock.

A Picture Is Worth a Thousand Words

If you have ever tried to explain computer configuration or processes to someone over the phone, you know the process can be quite frustrating. You are never quite sure if the person on the other end is looking at the same thing on their screen that you are.

A quick way to ease this predicament is to write up your instructions and include pictures. Word, in conjunction with Windows, makes this quite easy. Try this the next time you are faced with this task:

1. On your computer, walk through the steps you want to explain.

2. At appropriate times, capture the entire screen or a single dialog box to the Clipboard. You do this by pressing the **Print Screen** key to capture the entire screen, or **Alt+Print Screen** to capture the active window or dialog box.

3. Paste the captured screen information into Word by pressing **Ctrl+V**.

4. Add any explanatory text necessary.

5. Repeat steps 2 through 4 until you are finished.

Save your document.

At this point you can e-mail the document to the remote site, or you can transmit it in some other way, such as printing or by disk.

Up Telescope! The Man with the Bionic Eye

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Hopefully you are not one of the more than 17 million people over age 65 who has either lost or are losing their vision due to agerelated macular degeneration, or known simply as AMD, the leading cause of blindness in older Americans.

Thanks to the marvels of technology, however, hope – and sight -- are being restored for qualified AMD patients – like 82-year-old Dan Dunbar of Costa Mesa, Calif.

Dunbar is only the second person in the United States to have the CentraSight telescope, a surgical device the size of a pea, implanted into his left eye where his vision was worse than in his right eye.

According to the manufacturer, advanced stage AMD patients have a central blind spot or missing area in their vision that neither glasses, drugs or cataract surgery can fix. Everyday activities like reading, watching TV, seeing faces, brushing teeth, applying makeup or preparing meals are difficult and challenging.

To qualify for the implant, patients must:

Have irreversible, end-stage AMD resulting from either dry or wet AMD.

No longer be a candidate for drug treatment.

Never had cataract surgery in the implant eye.

Meet the age (over 75), vision and cornea health requirements.

The patients' physicians must assess if the benefits outweigh the risks before deciding if the implant treatment option is a viable one for them. The new medical device and technology do not offer a total cure but will restore vision enough to improve their independence and ability to perform normal activities.

For Dunbar, who loves to ski, dabble in model trains and do woodworking, the surgery is a "miracle", he said. Although it wasn't an overnight difference-maker, he appreciates every moment of his new world of sight. In case you are wondering, his driving days are over but his wife, Jean, son and two daughters take him everywhere he needs to go.

"In my case, the surgery took only 90 minutes, but my eyes were dilated for almost three months before I could feel the results of the telescope," he said.

Meanwhile, the former "rocket scientist" (he helped develop

a liquid rocket system that was used by U.S. defense agencies) continues to undergo special eye exercises designed to improve his peripheral and "straight ahead" vision as well as his depth perception. But with the help of a few ordinary vision aids (illuminated magnifying glasses and goggles) and his new bionic eye, he can see things he could never see before.

Dunbar's vision problems began in 1960 when he became nearsighted in high school, the result of scarring and a bleeding artery in his retina. For 30 years, he suffered from continued vision loss and attacks of blood vessel bleeding. Doctors were unable to diagnose or treat the disorder beyond occasional, often painful cortisone shots.

Through referrals from various local optometrists, including one at Costco, opthalmologists and his own veterinarian son, Dunbar learned about the CentraSight telescope implant from a Beverly Hills retina specialist, Dr. David Boyer. After determining that he was a perfect candidate for the procedure, eye surgeon Dr. Samuel Masket performed the surgery in November 2011 at Good Samaritan Hospital in Los Angeles.

"When Dr. Boyer explained the technology, the procedure and the healing process to me, it sounded very reasonable and I put my full trust in the medical team," he said.

Following the surgery, Dunbar began several weeks of rehabilitation at The Center for Partially Sighted in Culver City. He continues to perform eye exercises at home and returns to the center less frequently.

"I can see faces clearly at more than 20 feet. Being able to watch a person's face as you to talk to them is a feature that I had forgotten. Now I can not only see their faces and their reactions to my words, I can also see their eyes and where they are looking," he said.

However, Dunbar is most proud of his ability to return to his normal "blue" level ski slopes. "I found that my telescope gives me excellent distance assessment of the snow on the runs...and it allows me to see other skiers, recognize each daughter and grandsons at 100 feet and to see the snow conditions in front of me," he added.

"Not a day goes by that I don't see something I haven't seen in five years. I feel part of the world again."
