Dropbox Paper Challenges Evernote, Google Keep, Zoho Notebook, OneNote and Other Cloud-Connected Note-Taking Products

Evernote has long been one of the best note-taking apps for use by genealogists and by millions of others. I have been a big Evernote fan for years and still am. However, Evernote recently increased the prices of its Plus and Premium versions. Evernote Basic remains available free of charge but is now limited to two devices per account, like a computer and a phone, two computers, or a phone and a tablet. Bummer! (See my earlier article at https://goo.gl/n0v4qa for the details.)

Many Evernote users were disappointed by the news and have since looked for replacement programs. See my article about one possible replacement at https://goo.gl/EwKVFN while others are switching to Microsoft's OneNote (see https://goo.gl/deGfCZ). Now a new candidate from a well-known vendor is entering the marketplace.

Dropbox has long been a very popular cloud-based file storage service. Most Dropbox users find it is an excellent service for making backup copies of files as well as copying (or "replicating") those files amongst multiple computers, such as keeping the same files at all times on both your desktop and laptop computers. The same files also can be retrieved on an iPad, iPhone, Android device, Windows Phone, or even on a Kindle Fire. Now Dropbox is adding a new trick that appears to be aimed at enticing Evernote users to switch to Dropbox's new service.



Dropbox Paper is a brand-new offering that is still in beta testing but available to anyone who would like to try it. In it's simplest form, Dropbox Paper is a note-taking application built into the Dropbox file storage and replication service. It is designed for note taking and it (optionally) replicates copies of those notes to the owner's Windows computers, Macintosh computers, iPad, iPhone, and Android devices. All the notes are also available on any computer by opening a web browser and going to the Dropbox Paper web site. Does this sound like Evernote? You bet it does! I doubt if that is a coincidence.

Dropbox is also making a play for corporate users, again competing with Evernote. Dropbox Paper is cloud-connected so

that your group can meet up in the same document and at the same time, regardless of where all team members are located or what devices they are currently using. Team members can enrich shared pages with lists, blocks of code, and embedded media. They can even embed Dropbox documents in your pages.

Dropbox Paper displays all related mentions, comments, shares and other notifications in a neat little list. That list and its associated pages can all file into folders, which you can sort by team or topic.

This is a huge part of how Dropbox is "reimagining the way people work together," said Christina Cacioppo, Paper product manager. "Dropbox Paper is built to help fast-moving teams organize all their team's knowledge in a single place, creating a home for their projects."

Downsides

Dropbox Paper is still in beta. It probably is still a bit buggy so if you try it please do not be surprised if you encounter a few bugs or if all the features are not yet enabled. I have tried it briefly and it does look good.

I will caution you, however, thatDropbox Paper does not yet seem to have much security. I'm using it for my recipes and for other non-secret items. However, I wouldn't use Dropbox Paper just yet for anything sensitive, such as my credit card information, bank account info, or anything else I would like to keep private.

Dropbox's security reportedly is not as good as that of some of its competitors. You can learn more at http://tiptopsecurity.com/is-dropbox-safe-to-use-how-dropbox-works-to-secure-your-files-online/ although that article was written before Dropbox Paper was announced this week.

In contrast, Evernote has excellent security, especially if you use the "Encrypted Text Within a Note" option. For details, see https://evernote.com/security/ and especially scroll down to the "Encrypted Text Within a Note" section.

Alternatively, you can use a competing service like SpiderOak which does not have the capability for anyone else to see your data as long as you're using the SpiderOak client you installed on your computer. SpiderOak and Tresorit seem to have the best security of all the cloud-based file storage services. However, those two services do not yet offer note-taking applications.

Summation

Dropbox Paper looks like it may become a strong (and FREE or low-cost) competitor to Evernote. You might want to try it now to see for yourself. However, if you don't want to deal with beta software, you might want to wait a few months before trying it.

What to Do if You Fell for a Tech Support Scam

10-point action plan for resolving fake tech support access to your PC: Internet Scambusters #710

Tech support scams affect 3.3 million people and cost \$1.5 billion every year.

So what do you do if you're one of those unfortunate victims? We'll give you a 10-point action plan in this week's issue, along with information about a new variation in the tax bill scam.

What to Do if You Fell for a Tech Support Scam

Much as most of us like to think we're smart enough not fall for a scam, millions of people are conned every year into giving access to their PCs to tech support imposters.

These are the people who claim to be from Microsoft or another computer firm. They tell you they've detected a virus on your PC and need to be given remote access to put it right.

You probably know what "remote access" is, but for those who don't, it's a feature of Windows that enables someone in another location to access your PC via the Internet.

But you have to give them permission via your PC first, which is why these scammers make their spoof calls.

Once they get access, they can digitally crawl all over your PC, looking for confidential information like passwords and account numbers.

And after they're done, they may leave a piece of malware on your PC that enables them to access it at any time or plug it

We've reported on the tech support scam before in our article, Latest Car Parts, Tech Support and Domain Name Scams, and hope you've managed to evade these crooks.

But what if you — or someone you know — gets caught out and gives PC access to these crooks?

According to Microsoft's Digital Crime Unit, some 3.3 million people fall victim to the tech support scam every year, costing victims around \$1.5 billion.

How will you know you're one of those victims? It's simple. If someone phoned you claiming to be from Tech Support or claiming they've detected a virus on your PC and they need access, it was a scam.

Tech companies just don't operate that way.

Put it this way: If they knew what was happening on your PC, that would mean they must already have remote access, so why would they need to request it?

So if you gave the caller access, you've exposed your PC security to them.

A more clever way the scammers may try to reach you is by tricking you into downloading malware onto your PC, which then flashes a warning that you have a virus and need to contact "tech support" to have it removed.

Again, that's not the way legitimate security software works. If it identifies a virus, it will tell you and give you the option of deleting it but genuine security software doesn't ask you to make a phone call.

Once you realize what's happened, you need to take immediate action to minimize the potential damage.

10-Point Plan

Some of the things you should do are similar to those for identity theft. After all, that's most likely what will have happened after a scammer gets access to your computer. Here's our 10-point plan to deal with it:

- 1. Shut down and disconnect your device from the Internet. That puts an absolute stop on any external meddling. It also often automatically revokes remote access for when you restart.
- 2. Ideally, you would have a full system backup that would enable you to restore your computer to its previous state, ensuring the scammers no longer have access to your machine.

If you don't know how to back up your system, you might visit the site of our friend Leo Notenboom and search on "backup." Or just do a Google search on your Internet browser – but be careful that you visit a legitimate site.

3. If you don't have a backup, run the Windows "System Re-

store" feature. Visit microsoft.com to learn how to do this.

- **4.** Whether you restored your system or not, ensure your Internet security software is up to date and run a FULL virus scan to remove any lingering malware.
- **5.** If you know how to do it, check your web browser's settings for any newly installed extensions or add-ons you don't recognize and delete them.
- **6.** If you don't know how to do this or you're still not certain your machine is "clean," have it professionally checked.
- 7. Only when you've done all this should you change all passwords. Yes, all passwords on every account you access via your PC.
- **8.** Alert your bank and credit card companies and monitor all statements online every day, looking for suspicious items.
- 9. Put a freeze on credit applications via the three credit monitoring agencies Equifax, Experian and TransUnion. This will cost a few dollars but is worth it. Each of the bureaus has its own "credit lock" service but you might find the following article useful: Credit Freeze and Thaw Guide.
- **10.** File a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC).

Whether you're a victim of a tech support scam or not, make a point of educating yourself about these tricks and how to avoid them.

BACK TO BASICS

Microsoft "Edge" – The New Web Browser with Windows 10

One of the apps (programs) that come free with Windows 10 is their new web browser called Edge which is supposed to replace Microsoft Internet Explorer. The icon for Edge is still a white or blue letter "e" but with a cut instead of a yellow sash. Although Microsoft claims several improvements or better web interactions with their new browser, my experience with Edge has made me decide to continue using Internet Explorer or Firefox.

In Microsoft's enthusiasm to upgrade and provide some new cool features, it seems they once again failed in the area of making it easy for users to convert to their new version. They have moved things around, re-configured the appearance, and confused the icons and tools. I give Edge, as it exists today a grade of Dminus. I am all in favor of improvements, but I also want to be able to easily do today in the new version what I did yesterday in the old. So, as we all should do, I asked Google about the problems I was experiencing and found much help and equally discouraging comments on the internet from others. I don't need to see videos of all the new wonderful features. I first need to see videos and learn how I can do what I have always done in the past on the new version or upgrade.

My recommendation would be to continue using your current web browser on Windows 10 until Microsoft improves Edge, which will probably take some time. Here are a few areas that were difficult for me in Edge:

FAVORITES (also known as "bookmarks" in some internet browsers) – I am a big fan of using favorites on my web browser. I have hundreds of them. If you upgrade to Win10 on

your existing computer, most likely Edge will easily import your favorites from your previous browser program, such as from Internet Explorer, and that's fine. But if you want to import your favorites yourself (by exporting a file from your old browser such as from another computer as I did) you will find that Edge does not accept or import favorites from an exported file. The only solution I found for this was to actually install my existing browser program on my new computer, import the favorites to it, then have Edge get the favorites from that old browser program. But if I install my old browser and I am ready to go, why should I trouble myself to convert to Edge at all?

Also be aware that Edge may already have many "favorites" already installed, so you should delete those that you do not want before you have Edge install your list. Once you have your favorites in Edge, sorted into folders, of course, I find that you cannot drag a favorite from one folder into another. You can only drag them out of the source folder into just "favorites" and then you have to go back and drag them from there into your destination folder. Another confusing change is to have two different icons for favorites - one to go to a favorite (an icon of lines) but another (star) if you want to create a new favorite or try to reorganize your favorites. In Internet Explorer you had one icon for favorites and the "organize favorites" option appeared right at the top.

MISSING HOME BUTTON – The home button is not on the tool bar by default, you must go to the "settings" and then to the "advanced settings" list to turn it on. I like having the home button to start over, they should have kept it. Of course when you do this and it appears, it is located in a different place than where it appeared in Internet Explorer.

ASK GOOGLE – Fortunately, you can "Ask Google" anything about Edge and get some answers and help. You will also find that you are not the first person to ask your question or experience your problem. Without Google's on line help, my difficulties would be, well, much more difficult. By asking Google I can find a way to do what I did before on the old version, or I will find out that it can't be done it at all.
