He will share what he learns there when he speaks to us in February.

During our November meeting we will be looking at some powerful **scanners** that can be used to help us minimize the papers we keep at home. I think many people will be as dazzled I was to see these up close.

We will also see a short demonstration about a \$50 Remix Android **Mini PC**. This little Android computer uses the same operating system as many of our tablets and cell phones. After seeing what this can do we will raffle it off at the meeting!

Earlier this month I went to a presentation on the most recent update to the Windows 10 operating system. If you are running **Windows 10 this "Anniversary edition"** (version 1607) will be pushed out to you in the next month. This is a large update and may take a while to install.

Many of these changes won't be obvious and are behind the scenes. Some will be noticeable on a Microsoft phone or touch screen tablet of PC. It is thought the some of the changes are making way for Microsoft to deliver ads on the most common windows screens. They seem to be looking for a way to recover the costs of giving us our most recent operating system for free.

Art of Transcription: A Practical Guide

Here is an interesting and educational article by Sarah Minegar, Archivist, for Washington's Headquarters in Morristown, New Jersey. She writes:

"You schedule a research appointment at your local library. When you arrive, you are handed a large packet of information about your topic, transcriptions of every manuscript you wish to research, and a full description of the potential resources you may want to study. "FOLLY!

"The Hollywood research stylings of shows like Who Do You Think You Are? and History Detectives may have introduced the world to the archivist and the special collections repository, but they also speed up and enhance the research process to a misleading degree. As an archivist, I can tell you with certainty that historical manuscripts do not often arrive with background information and they are definitely not transcribed. In fact, often the first mystery a researcher encounters is simply a question of content (i.e. what does the document say?)

"Do not fret, you are equipped with paleography decoding skills! Now let's take a closer look at the transcription process."

How to Block Microphone Eavesdropping

Is the microphone on your computer, tablet or smartphone eavesdropping on your conversations, even when you're not using it?

During the past few years, reports of devices and programs listening in to nearby conversations have repeatedly surfaced.

At the same time, numerous devices, apps and even hackers are known to have the ability to switch your mic on when you're using your device, both for legitimate and dubious purposes.

Obviously, there may be plenty of occasions when you need and want to use the microphone — making Skypetype voice-over-internet calls, for example, or using built-in virtual assistants such as Siri (Apple devices), Cortana (Windows) and Alexa (Amazon).

Then there are programs like speech-to-text, voice recognition software, and apps that let you instruct them instead of using your keyboard. Even Google's Chrome browser has the ability to act on voice commands — if it's switched on.

Provided you're in control of when your mic is active and that whoever (or whatever) is listening in is doing so because you invited them is all well and good.

But that's not always the case. Sometimes you don't realize your microphone is on — you may even think you switched it off — and sometimes people are listening in for questionable purposes.

For instance, computer users have, from time to time, reported speaking words in online conversations that subsequently seem to trigger pop-up advertisements on certain web pages and social media networks, though these claims are usually denied.

It has not always been clear to what extent some legitimate apps, like Microsoft's Cortana, gather information about what you're saying, leading to genuine privacy concerns.

And, on the other side of the law, hackers have demonstrated how they can trick their way into computers and smartphones to switch on microphones without users being aware.

A couple of years ago, computer security firm Panda identified spyware that could switch on a phone's mic, identify where the device was located, record conversations and track the user all day.

This sort of eavesdropping goes hand-in-hand with illegal or questionable remote accessing of web cameras, which we reported on in an earlier issue, Webcam Safety Threatened by Crooks and Spies.

There's no better evidence that the risk of this spying is real than the recent publication of a photo of Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg, whose laptop, in the background of the photo, was seen to have tape placed over both the camera and mic.

You can usually tell if your camera is in use because most of them have a tiny light next to the lens that switches on with the camera. But with a microphone, there's generally no visible signal.

It's also reportedly possible in some circumstances for headphones and even speakers to be used to collect conversation, even when a microphone is turned off or disconnected.

It's all this uncertainty over whether, how and why speech is being eavesdropped that creates user concern.

So, what can you do about it?

While we can't guarantee to make you soundproof, there are a number of key actions you can take to minimize the risk of being overheard or recorded, or of your microphone being activated without your knowledge.

Here's a quick rundown:

*Learn how to manually disable the microphone setting on your device, or search out software that will do this automatically for you. Then, disable the mic when you don't need it.

*You can also physically disable a microphone by plugging a cheap, wired mic into the microphone extension socket and then snipping the wire. The extension is activated as the default input source but there's no microphone.

If you have a combined headphone/mic outlet, you would need a combination headset and again, snip the wire just below the microphone.

(Note, however, that hackers may be able to switch your default setting back to the built-in microphone.)

*When installing programs, especially smartphone apps, check if they require access to your mic. Many apps will request permission, at least during first use. Deny it unless you're really going to need it.

*For programs and apps that are already installed, use their "settings" feature to check if they can ac-

cess the microphone, or check the "microphone" or "privacy" listing in your settings.

For example, if you use an iPad or iPhone, visit settings/ privacy/microphone to see which apps use your mic. The same sequence in Windows 10 will perform the same task, with the ability to switch off the microphone altogether or to deny access to individual apps. Search online for how to do this on other devices.

Keep your Internet security software up to date to keep hackers out or to alert you when programs behave suspiciously.

By the way, tests suggest that Mark Zuckerberg's attempt to limit microphone access by using masking take doesn't work. It might muffle the sound but it probably wouldn't keep the eavesdroppers out!

Alert of the Week

Do you have an outlook.com email address? If so, beware of a message from "Outlook Administrator" that arrives in your inbox with the subject line: "Microsoft account unusual sign-in activity."

The message goes on to warn:

"We detected something unusual about a recent activity to the Microsoft account. To help keep you safe, we required an extra security challenge. You will need to verify your Microsoft email account below to confirm that the recent activity was yours and to regain access and enjoy our unlimited service."

It's quite a convincing phishing attempt to get your Microsoft sign-on details and, although the scam has been around for a while, there's been a resurgence in recent weeks.

What's New in Microsoft Office 2016

Last September, Microsoft kept to its usual three-year schedule of issuing a new edition of Office when it released Office 2016. The questions always are, What is different in this edition? Is it worth upgrading? Here are a few of the features you will find in this new Office. Maybe they will answer these questions for you.

The basic commands and toolbars (ribbons) have not changed much from the last few versions. But Microsoft does often streamline and refine processes, and 2016 is



no exception. The new version makes more use of One Drive, the Microsoft cloud, in order to make sharing Office files easier. Click the **Share** button on the top

right of the ribbon to open the Share sidebar. If your file is not saved to OneDrive, you will be instructed to save it there.



Then type an email address or choose one from your address book in the "Invite people" box and choose either "Send as attachment" or "Get a sharing link." This process is generally the same as in Office 2010 and 2013 except it is much easier to access.

Searching is easier in Office 2016, too, with the new "Tell me what you want to

☐ Tell me what you want to do

do" box above the ribbon in all the Office programs.

When you click in the box, you get suggestions for things you might want to do, based on the program you are using and what you're doing with it, or you can type in a new search topic. I think this feature needs a bit more work, but once improved, can be very useful.



Another feature that has been improved in Office 2016 is called **Insights**, an expanded version of Smart Lookup. Right click a word or phrase in your document or presentation and choose Smart Lookup from the dropdown menu to open a sidebar which includes the definition, pronunciation (written and audio), explanations and examples from Wikipedia, and relevant results

of a Bing web search. This feature is much more extensive than the earlier Smart Lookup. In the example, I right-clicked the word *Upgrade* and got these results. (This is only part of the list.) This feature is found in Word, PowerPoint, Outlook, and Excel 2016.

Individual Office programs also got a few upgrades, too. Excel got several **new chart types**, with intriguing names like Waterfall and Sunburst. The new Forecasting feature predicts trends based on the current data and displays them in a Trend chart.



Office 2016 also offers a few brand new features. Anyone who uses a touch-enabled laptop or device with Office 2016 or Office mobile apps installed can use the new **Ink Notation** feature in Word, Excel, and Power-Point. Click or touch the new Draw tab in the ribbon; choose a color and pen size and draw on the screen. Make a mistake? Use the eraser. You can highlight words using the Ink toolbar, too. PowerPoint also allows you to convert your ink drawings into shapes.

PowerPoint and Word 2016 have a fascinating new feature, introduced in Office 2013, that allows you to remove the background of a photo. (See example.)





To remove the background, insert a photo into Word or PowerPoint, select it, and click the Picture Tools Format tab. On the left end of the Format ribbon, click **Remove Background**. If needed, you can adjust the

size of the area inside the picture or mark areas to keep or discard. Then click "Keep Changes" to view a copy of the photo with the background removed, leaving the original safe in your Pictures folder.

Another new feature in 2016 is the **Black theme**: a black background with white text, which is considered easier to read by some people with vision difficulties. Office 2013 featured the Colored theme, where each

Office app had its own background color: green for Excel, blue for Word, orange for Pow-



erPoint, and so on. This is still the default color theme. The other choices are Dark Gray and White. To change the background color, open any Office 2016 program, click File – Account, click the arrow next to Office theme

and make your choice. This will change the background for all Office programs.

Every year, it seems Microsoft offers new temptations for Office users to move to one of the subscription versions of Office, called Office 365. Office 2016 contains some new features which are only available to Office 365 subscription users. For example, PowerPoint has two of these features: **Morph** and **Designer**. Morph is a special kind of transition, where a shape or group of text can be set to move across the screen. Designer offers design ideas for photos which appear in slides, such as arrangement on the page or coloration. It can be found on the right end of the Design tab in PowerPoint. It does not work yet with all photos; a photo must be 200x200 or higher resolution.

Only Office 365 users of Word or PowerPoint 2016 can collaborate on projects in real time. Multiple editors can edit a file and watch each other's editing changes as they happen through the new **Collaborative Editing** feature. This is a popular feature with the Business version.

A recent trend in Office improvements is that they often occur periodically through regular monthly updates if you have a subscription version. I noticed that my Office 365 Home subscription introduced some of the features of Office 2016 before my applications began being labeled Office 2016.

If you are thinking of trying Office 2016, you might wonder if it will open all those documents and spreadsheets you created in earlier Office versions. If you have files created with Office 2007, 2010, or 2013, you will find them completely compatible with 2016. If you have files created with earlier versions, you can get a free Compatibility Pack at the Microsoft website, which will make older Word, Excel, and PowerPoint files compatible with Office 2016. Searching for "Compatibility Pack for MS Office 2016" will lead you to the download page in a hur-
