## Proving Oral History A Case Study in Genealogical Research

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Deborah Abbott, a favorite yearly speaker will be back this evening.

You will learn how to identify clues, master techniques and find resources that help to solve the unknown.

Deborah A. Abbott, Ph.D. will return for the 6th time to share with us her expertise on using various online computer resources to discover your genealogy.

**Deborah A. Abbott, Ph.D.**, is an adjunct faculty member at the Institute of Genealogy & Historical Research (IGHR) at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama and currently serves as the Cleveland District Trustee on the Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS) Board. ## 5 More Things You Can Do in Genealogy When You're Short on Time

Posted on March 10, 2017

We don't always have hours and hours that we can devote to our family history. However, that doesn't mean that we can't get something done. Here are 5 things you can do when you have even a spare 15 minutes.

By the way, if you're wondering about the title, this is a follow up to an earlier post, "5 Things You Can Do in Genealogy When You're Short on Time." Now, without further ado...

## 1. Check the Calendar of Events at Your Local Genealogy Society

Local genealogy societies are one of the greatest untapped resources in family history. Most of them have monthly meetings with presentations on a variety of topics. Even if you don't have ancestors in the area, those presentations could help you with your research.

## 2. Review What's Available at FamilySearch

Sure, you searched for great-great-grandma Matilda two months ago on FamilySearch. But guess what -- FamilySearch is adding stuff all the time. Be sure to see what online collections are new and which ones have been updated, as well as look in the catalog to see what offline materials are now available.

#### 3. Ask a Question

You can take this in many directions. You can ask a research question on a Facebook page or in a group. You could send a question to a librarian or archivist. You could ask a relative a family history question. (You could ask yourself a family history question!) You could

also come up with what your research question really is. (Check out this post to see why that's important.)

#### 4. Go Through One Folder

You're not going to get everything organized in one sitting. But you can go through one folder -- and it will be one more organized folder than what you had when you started.

#### 5. Share Something

Genealogy is about connections and sharing something we've found is a great way to make and strengthen those connections. I was thrilled when a cousin of mine started posting old family photos on Facebook, including several that I hadn't seen before -- like this one of my great-great-grandparents Eber and Lavada Jane (McKitrick) Mason.

It doesn't take long to share a little something. Maybe you send a photo to some cousins or you blog about something you recently found. You don't have to write the definitive volume of your family's history to share something.

So there you have it -- 5 more things you can do in your genealogy even when you're short on time. Feel free to check out my original 5 suggestions here.

How about you? What genealogy activities do you like to do when you're short on time?

## **Don't Fall for These 5 Common TV Scams**

Television viewing is a key element of many people's day-to-day lives, which makes it a top target for TV scams.

Crooks use all manner of tricks to fool victims into handing over money for nothing or giving away confidential information.

In this special issue, we're looking at 5 top scams linked to the TV world that you need to be on the lookout for.

Let's start with the most common TV scam currently doing the rounds:

### 1. Pay for a Discount Cable/Satellite TV Subscription

Many of us probably feel we already pay too much for our TV subscription, which is why viewers are increasingly "cutting the cord" and turning to alternative, Internet-based streaming TV.

For those of us still connected to cable or satellite TV boxes, who wouldn't be interested in an opportunity to pay less by paying upfront?

That's what scammers are counting on when they call consumers at home offering a prepayment deal.

One trick they use to convince victims the deal is for-real is to pretend the service provider has linked up with online retailer Amazon.

They add to the attractiveness of the supposed deal by promising additional premium channels for free.

They tell victims to buy an Amazon gift card, usually for several hundred dollars, and then call their "billing department" with the card codes.

The billing department is, of course, fake. The call is answered in the name of the TV service provider. The victim tells them the codes, which are presumably than rapidly converted into merchandise purchases.

It may be a while before the victim realizes what has happened.

As far as we've been able to tell, no genuine cable or satellite provider offers such a deal but that doesn't stop the crooks.

If you get a call offering this deal, hang up. It's as simple as that. But if you're wondering if it's genuine, call your TV service provider using their real number, which you'll find on your TV bill.

### 2. Same Call, Different Purpose

In a variation of this scam, victims are also offered cut price subscriptions but this time, the scammers ask for credit card details, including the security number printed on the back.

They may also ask for other information, like Social Security numbers, claiming they need this for security purposes.

But it's a straightforward identity theft ploy.

The same guidance applies as above: hang up.

Now, let's step outside, if you will, into the parking lot...

#### 3. The White Van Deal

In this longstanding and well-known scam, victims are approached in a parking lot, often close to a store that sells TVs.

The crook often has a vehicle (hence the "White Van" label) seemingly stocked with TVs that he's selling at a knockdown price.

He may suggest the items are stolen or that they're surplus stock from the nearby store.

He has a couple of genuine models to show you and the price is mouthwatering. And there, in the van or the trunk of a car, are half a dozen boxes, still sealed and gleamingly new.

Except that inside is a pile of rubbish that weighs about the same as a TV.

It's a classic confidence trick. Because you've seen the genuine object, you naturally believe that's what's in the box and so you probably won't open it till you get home.

By that time, the crook has disappeared with your money.

The moral: Don't buy stuff from parking lot vendors. You could be falling for a scam or, even if the deal is genuine, you could be buying stolen goods and could end up in trouble with the law.

#### 4. Scammed in the Dead of Night

Now, have you ever been up in the middle of the night and flicked on your TV only to find some sort of "miracle" product being promoted with a very convincing sales spiel by a smooth-talking presenter?

Some of these "infomercials" even appear on some channels during the day.

Maybe the product is genuine, but far too often the claims that are made turn out to be exaggerated at best or totally false at worst.

The fact is that the purveyors of these products pay for the TV time they use and, although the TV channels may be careful to try to avoid scams, they don't have the resources to check out some of the claims made on these shows.

If you want to see how outrageous some of these tricks can be, check out this list of examples in finance site Money Wizard's article: The 5 Most Hilariously Amusing TV Scams of All Time.

The site refers to the claims as "hilarious" but that probably isn't how people who paid for these products feel.

Solution: If you're interested in products promoted on these infomercials, do an online search to see what others are saying.

#### 5. Internet TV

The trend towards subscribing to streaming TV services, which we mentioned earlier, can make good financial sense but you have to be clear on what you're paying for.

Amid all the respectable streaming TV services, there's a small number of "Internet TV" services that offer access to hundreds of TV channels for payment of a one-off fee.

It's not so much a scam as a disappointment — when subscribers find they've paid for a poor-quality video viewer streaming channels in foreign languages or with very limited viewing appeal.

The lesson here again is to make sure you know what you're paying for by researching what others are writing about the service on offer.

The fact is that you'll get what you pay for — or, in this case, maybe even less.

## Co-Author Word 2016 Documents in Real Time

Sometimes we need to get another person's input on a document while we're composing it. In the past, we had to email versions of documents back and forth, with markups and comments. Office 2013 introduced a system where two users could see the same document on their screens at the same time, and both could make changes, although the changes weren't visible to the other person until they were saved. Office 2016 has upgraded and simplified this process. Now two or more users can edit the same document at the same time from different locations, and both can see changes being made as they occur. This is called "real time co-authoring." It isn't difficult at all. And it works with Word documents, Power Point presentations, and Excel workbooks. I'll use Word 2016 in Windows 10 to explain the steps:

- 1.Be sure you have OneDrive active on your computer, which might involve signing in to your Microsoft account. This free cloud location, which is built into recent Office versions, is where you can store documents and access them from anywhere over the Internet.




Figure 1 - Share window in Word 2016

- 2. Create a folder in OneDrive just for the purpose of co-authoring, and give it a name, like Share or Co-Author. Then save your document to this folder by clicking the File tab Share Share with People Save to Cloud. (Fig. 1) Navigate to your One Drive's Co-Author folder and click Save.

3. Now you are ready to invite a person or team to join you to edit your document. Click the Share icon on the right end of the ribbon. (Fig. 2) In the 'Invite people' box, enter one more email addresses or names to access your Contacts list. Leave 'Can edit' as the choice and add a short message, if desired.

4. Then choose a sharing method from those at the bottom of the Share pane. I prefer to use "Get a Sharing link" (Fig. 3) because my co-author will find his document opening either in his version of Word or in Word Online if he doesn't have Word 2010 or later on his computer. Word Online offers fewer editing options, but it works well for most editing tasks and can be used even by people who don't have Word at all.

Click "Create an edit link," (Fig. 4) then highlight the link that appears, and click Copy. Close the Sharing pane, open a new email message, paste the link into it, and send it to your co-author(s). Anyone who gets this link will be able to edit your document.

5. Your editing partner has a choice of whether to let you see his changes as they are being made. To do this, he must click the File tab – Options – General and, in the Real Time Collaboration section, click Always in the drop down menu. This option can be changed at any time. If he has chosen not to let you see changes in real time, you can only see them when he saves the document. During the editing process, colored flags appear in the spot each editor is working. Alerts appear when an editor arrives or leaves. Co-editors can communicate with each other during editing by clicking Comments in the ribbon at the top of the page to chat.

The best way to learn this process is to experiment. Ask a friend to be your test co-author and go through the steps. As usual, practice, if done properly, makes perfect.

## Tablet Checklist: What can it do?

## Q. A frequent question I get from users is: "What can a tablet actually do? Is it just for playing games?

That is why I've put this checklist together using the three main operating systems for tablets: Android, iOS (found on iPads), and Windows (this does not include the now discontinued Windows RT operating system.)

#### Read and Write E-mail

Android: Yes iPad: Yes

Windows Tables: Yes

#### **Surf the Internet**

Android: Yes iPad: Yes

Windows tablet: Yes

### Use Sites that Require Flash player:

Android: No iPad: No

Windows Tablet: Yes

#### **Play Games**

Android: Yes (With apps downloaded from Google Play

store)

iPad: Yes (With apps downloaded from Apple App store) Windows Tablet: Yes (With apps downloaded from Windows store. If a tablet model has enough computing power you can also download PC games. Windows 10 tablets will allow you to stream games from an Xbox One.

### **Use Office Programs**

Android: Yes (several office suites available including MS Office apps)

iPad: Yes (multiple office suites available as well as MS Office apps)

Windows Tablet: Yes (multiple office suites available and Microsoft Office apps. Users can also run the full desktop version of Office.)

#### Print

All three tablets will allow you to print from selected apps with compatible wireless printers.

#### Listen to Music

Android: You can stream from services like Pandora, Spotify, and Amazon as well keep digital copies of music on your tablet.

iPad: Designed to work especially well with iTunes; you can also stream using apps for services like Pandora and Spotify. Windows Tablet: Works with streaming services and Groove Music.

#### **Stream Movies**

All three operating systems will allow you to watch services like Netflix or Hulu, as well as view videos on websites. (If the videos require Flash Player, only a Windows table will work.)

#### eBooks

All three tablets will allow you to download apps for reading eBooks including Kindle and Nook books.

Use Facebook and other Social Media All three tablets will allow you to use a Facebook app.

#### Make Video Calls

All three tablets allow you to use Skype and other services for video calls and programs like Messenger for video or audio chats in addition to text chatting. Almost every tablet has a built-in front-facing camera.

### Use a Keyboard

Nearly any tablet will allow you to connect with a keyboard (usually via Bluetooth). There are keyboard cases available for carrying convenience. Make sure you get the compatible keyboard for your tablet. If it is a case, make sure it is the right size.

### Use a Mouse

Only Windows tablets are compatible with using a mouse and it is a fairly simple process to pair a Bluetooth mouse.

### **Use Desktop Versions of Programs**

Only Windows tablets can run full desktop versions of programs.

### **Access Cloud Storage**

All three tablets will allow you access could storage.
