A Word From Our President



I marvel how we are living in a time of such technical innovation! I am looking forward to our August program where we will look at a 3d printer and hear how it works.

I have talked before about some technology that I have enjoyed such as the Amazon Echo. This device is classified as a Home Personal Assistant. A similar item from Google is the "Google Home". Market researcher, eMarketer, reports that 35.6 million Americans will use a voice-activated speaker in 2017, 70.6% of which will use Alexa and 3.8% will use Google Home.

"Amazon's voice assistant, Alexa, is infiltrating your home, your beach trips and even your ride to work. Now that there are four ways to interact with Alexa -- with the Tap, Echo and Dot devices, and with the Amazon Fire TV -- you might find yourself talking to her more often."

I haven't used the Google Home which just came out in late 2016 and costs a little more. I have had the Amazon Echo since it first came out and this year I got the smaller Amazon Dot which I use in the bedroom to play music, act as an alarm clock, and to check the weather and the news. The "dot" is much less expensive than the original echo which has a very nice speaker. An additional speaker can be used with the dot if desired but I don't find it necessary.

I use the original echo in the living room for all the same things as the smaller dot but because of the location I used this echo for music, and acting as my frequent companion.

She will look up facts for you, tell you this day in history, play most songs on command, read you an audio book, tell you a joke or play a game with. You can ask her to add something to your to do list or your shopping list. You can place an order for common items directly from Amazon with the Alexa. (This is thought to be Amazon's main purpose in developing this personal assistant.)



There are Smart Home features that require the addition of a device such as a hub to allow you to control lights, thermostat, and security controls. I haven't explored these options YET.

One interesting future option that is expected sounds interesting -- the ability to

New Records Available To Search This Findmypast Friday

The following announcement was written by the folks at Findmypast:



Somerset Baptisms Index

Our new collection of Somerset Baptisms is an index to more than 2.1 million parish baptisms held at the Somerset Archives. The collection consists of transcripts spanning the years 1501 to 1917 and covers baptisms performed in 496 parishes across the county. The amount of information found in each record will depend on the date and legibility of the original document. Most transcripts will reveal your ancestor's date of birth, baptism date, where the ceremony was performed, their religious denomination, parent's names and father's occupation.

Somerset Banns Index

The Somerset Banns Index contains over 258,000 transcripts of original parish records. The collection consists of transcripts dating back to 1577 that will reveal where and when the banns were read, the couple's residences, marital status and their intended year of marriage.

Somerset Marriages Index

Find out when and where your Somerset ancestors were married with over 1 million transcripts spanning nearly 500 years of the county's history. The records found in this collection are a combination of transcripts created by Findmypast from original registers held by the Somerset Archives and transcripts gathered and created from original records by the Somerset & Dorset Family History Society. Each transcript transcripts will provide you with the names of both the bride and groom, their birth years, residences, occupations, marital status, marriage date, location, the names of their fathers and will reveal whether they were married by banns or license. Later records may even reveal the names of any witnesses present.

Somerset Burials Index

Were your West Country ancestors were laid to rest in Somerset? Search more than 1.5 million transcripts to discover when your ancestor died and where they spent their final days. Each transcript will reveal the year of your ancestor's birth, residence, death year and burial date.

Tech support tricksters employ new Office scam: Internet Scambusters #762

Theft Risks from 3 New Microsoft Office Scams

The widespread use of one of the best-known business and productivity software suites makes it a great target in the shape of Microsoft Office scams.

We've previously warned about the risks of Office macro viruses — malware that's triggered when automatic routines, known as macros, are run inside programs like Word and Excel — in a past article: *Macros: What They Are and How They Could Imperil You*.

But that's only part of the story.

Now, it seems, the Office Suite is being used as a front for a new version of the tech support scam.

If you've ever installed one of these Office programs, you'll know that you have to activate it once it's up and running.

Activation means that your PC checks in online with Microsoft to ensure you're running a genuine version of the software that hasn't been used elsewhere.

That should be it. But in this latest scam, a window pops up again at some stage after installation warning the software hasn't been properly activated.

It might happen immediately after an installation or at any future time.

The warning takes victims through a series of screens that ask them to enter a product key or to call a toll-free number.

You can enter the correct product key as many times as you want but it won't do any good. In the end, you'll be told you must call the supposed tech support toll free number.

This will connect you with a fake tech who will ask for remote access to your PC, then present you with

the news that your computer has been infected and you must pay \$200 to put things right.

Once they're paid, the scammers will provide a product key which turns off their warning. Victims are left believing they've genuinely been helped!

The problem is that if you try to ignore the warning, you may find it difficult to get rid of it on your screen. It will stay on top of every other window.

However, according to a genuine tech support site (BleepingComputer.com), if you enter the key THTY4-89LK6-RTI23-XZTOP-05ERY, the screen will close.

(We can't say whether this works or not, as we don't have the virus.)

But that won't get rid of the underlying malware that is causing the trouble in the first place. Doing that is a more complex problem, which may be best left to a professional.

However, you can check out Bleeping Computer's suggested solutions in their *Microsoft Office Activation Wizard Tech Support Scam Removal Guide*.

The important point is that for this scam to work, your computer would have to be compromised in the first place — that is, there must be a virus on board to run the phony activation warning.

That means you downloaded it without knowing and without having adequate protection in place.

Make sure your Internet security software is up to date and you should be protected from falling for this trouble-making and costly scam.

Office 365 Scam

Microsoft's cloud-based version of its productivity software — Office 365 — is also being used as a front for another scam, this time for stealing user names and passwords.

The scam seems to be mainly targeting businesses and its ultimate aim could be to steal company information by signing on to Office 365 in victims' names and then downloading their files.

It starts with an email that pretends to be from Microsoft, concerning the user's Office 365 subscription. There's a link to a fake Microsoft site which requests sign-on details.

After that, the user's account is open to be plundered by the crooks until the victim either changes the password or contacts Microsoft.

For a while, it seemed that the link in the phony email was capable of bypassing some security software.

This has likely been resolved by now but it serves as a warning. If you're an Office 365 user and receive an email like this, don't click the link but speak to your own system admins or sign on independently to your Office 365 account and check things from there.

Robocall Trick

Finally, one more Microsoft scam to alert you to.

This time, it's one of those dreaded robocalls, in this case warning that your Microsoft product — either Office or Windows — has expired.

Victims are told they must renew their subscription via a toll-free number.

If they call, they end up paying \$100 or more as well as running the risk of having their credit card

details stolen and used for identity theft.

There are a couple of important tell-tale signs that this is a scam.

First, automated calls are illegal without explicit permission from you.

Second, Windows and standalone versions of Microsoft Office are not subscription-based. You never have to renew them if you don't want to (although they may become outdated or even unsupported by Microsoft).

Office 365 is subscription-based but reminders are sent out by email, not by phone. And payment is usually deducted automatically from your bank account unless you cancel it.

So, if you get this robocall, you can be sure it's an Office scam.

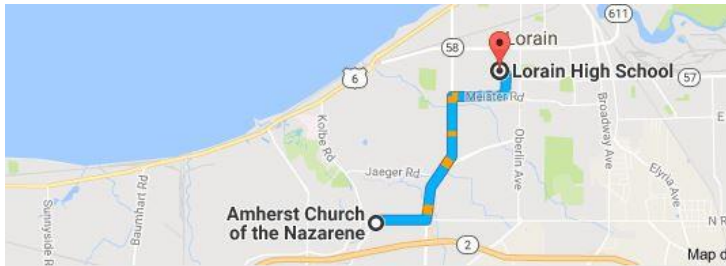
