Update to IGRS Early Irish Birth, Marriage & Death Indexes

The following announcement was written by the folks at the Irish Genealogical Research Society:

The Irish Genealogical Research Society (IGRS) has added a further 5,000 records to the Society's Early Irish Birth, Marriage and Death Indexes. This brings the total number of names to almost 260,000.

This latest update means the Society's exclusive collection of lesser used and obscure sources for Irish births, marriages and deaths now comprises a total of 24,500 births (noting 47,800 names), 83,600 marriages (186,800 names) and 16,800 deaths (24,500 names). The total number of names is 259,500.

This particular update draws from a range of material: surviving 19th century census records; marriage licence indexes; pre-1922 abstracts from exchequer and chancery court records; memorial inscriptions; biographical notices from newspapers; a large number of long forgotten published works on particular families and places; and memorials from Ireland's Registry of Deeds.

One of the rare books from which data is drawn is the *Memoirs of the Fultons of Lisburn*, published in 1903, which includes references not only to folk called Fulton, but many other associated families from the area. With reference to the quality and usefulness of this material, project coordinator Roz McCutcheon said "As an example, the Fulton Memoirs provide great detail, allowing long dead people to be easily identified. Take Richard Fulton of Lisburn, as an example. We can conclude he was dead by April 1823, having outlived his wife, Elizabeth, whose maiden surname was Shanks, and who had died before him in July 1812 aged 60, and thus born about 1752."

"In addition to the publications," Roz continued "this particular update draws heavily from Registry of Deeds memorials, access to which is now much easier since FamilySearch uploaded images of the old 1950s microfilms at the beginning of this year. Contrary to popular belief, the memorials make reference to all sorts of types and classes of people. A deed of 1808 allowed us to flesh out an entry in the death index to a widowed shopkeeper called Jane Rooney, noting her address as South Great George's, Dublin and her maiden surname as Kirk. It also linked her to her married sister, Matilda

McDonnell. Another deed, from 1795, named the late Robert Dempsey of Co. Wexford, noting his widow as Catherine, with a maiden surname of Cardiff."

The census data includes both original material - that which survived the conflagration of 1922 - and transcripts of that which did not. Counties Fermanagh. Kilkenny, Tipperary and Waterford are particularly represented. The return for the Greene family from Clonmel, Co. Tipperary in the 1841 census – data entered into the Death Index - was particularly poignant. It noted George Greene, a publican, and then lists the members of his household who had predeceased him. These were his first wife, Margaret, who died in 1828, and four of his children: Michael, Patrick, James and Margaret, who died in 1833, 1837, 1831 and 1833 respectively, aged from 3 months to 10 years.

Stop press - We hope to have an exciting, additional update of BMD data later in the year, so keep checking the IGRS website for more news!

The ZIP compression format is extensively used, and was originally developed in 1989. A ZIP file may contain one or more files or directories that may have been compressed. Microsoft operating systems have recognized ZIP files since 1998, but their manipulation within Windows can be awkward and sometimes difficult.

IZArc is a free file compression utility supporting many archive formats. With a modern easy-to-use interface, IZArc provides support for most compressed and encoded files. You can also open CD/DVD image files. It is also possible to convert files from one compression type to another. IZarc is a convenient way to send large files or groups of files to your friends; it also can encrypt your ZIPped files with the most modern tools available. Great for sending confidential information to your accountant or attornev.

Protect Your Cash from Fake Check Scams

Could you spot a fake check scam?

You might think you're smart enough, but every year thousands of people — maybe tens or even hundreds of thousands — pay the price of believing a phony check they received is genuine.

The fact is that modern computer and printing technology make it reasonably easy to produce authentic-looking checks that not even an expert could identify without making further inquiries.

In fact, according to the American Bankers Association, fake checks are one of the biggest causes of consumer fraud today. "Scam artists are using sophisticated technology to create counterfeit checks that mirror the appearance of legitimate checks," they warn.

"Some are counterfeit money orders, some are phony cashier's checks and others look like they are from legitimate business accounts. The companies whose names appear may be real, but someone has dummied up the checks without their knowledge."

There are five major targets for this type of fraud.

1. Overpayment Scams

This is probably the most widespread check scam, sometimes also referred to as an advance payment scam.

Crooks send out dud checks to victims, asking them to wire part of the money supposedly to a third party. The hope is the victim will bank the check and wire the money before the fake is discovered.

They use all types of creative stories to convince their victims that they're genuine, most notably for employment scams. For example:

- ** Pretending the money is for a secret shopper program where the victim is supposed to test a store's moneywiring services.
- ** Other work-from-home schemes, where part of the money has to be wired for supplies or training materials.
- * Supposedly hiring someone as a tutor or caregiver and then asking the victim to forward the money to buy special equipment that's needed.

Scammers also target small firms, placing orders and then requesting them to forward part of the money to a "shipper." In virtually all cases, these scams involve wiring money, the final destination for which is untraceable.

As we never tire of warning: Don't wire money to people you don't know!

2. Payment for Purchase

In the old days, when someone bought something from you and paid by check, you could usually trust them to be the genuine article — but no longer.

You advertise something for sale, say on Craigslist or a community noticeboard, and someone turns up to buy it, with a check or cashier's order.

You simply can't tell from looking at that piece of paper whether it's real or not. But if it's not drawn on a local bank, you should be suspicious.

Either way, you can phone the bank to check if it's legit. Or you can take steps to check the buyer's ID, such as seeing their driver's license.

Better yet, state in your ad that you'll only accept cash. However, if it's for a large sum, you'll need to know how to check if the notes are genuine. Find the answer to this in an online search.

3. A First Installment

This a sort of advance fee scam used to try to convince people they won a lottery — or even inherited money from a Nigerian prince.

Victims receive the check, usually by courier, with an urgent message that they need to pay out of their own funds for their winnings or inheritance to be released.

Once more, the money has to be wired — but you should never, ever pay money to collect supposed winnings. Follow that rule and you'll never be scammed in this trick.

4. Bank Account Access

Students and other people who are financially hard-pressed have been known to sell their bank account details to scammers or otherwise to permit their account to be used to "process payments."

Sometimes, they're even persuaded to hand over their ATM card and claim it was lost or stolen.

The scammers use the account to deposit fake checks, sometimes using smartphone apps, and then immediately withdraw the cash.

This may sound crazy but people have been caught doing this. They not only end up owing all of the missing money to the bank but run the risk of being labelled an accomplice and appearing in court.

5. A Friendly Cashier

It used to be if you needed cash in a hurry you could ask a friend or a local convenience store to cash a check for you. But today, if you're the one handing over the cash, you could find yourself the loser — if the check bounces or is fake.

You may have friends you can trust, but if someone turns up at your front door claiming they just moved into the neighborhood, or turns up at your front desk or register claiming to be from a business just down the road, beware!

These days, the legitimate use of checks is declining but, sadly, fake checks are on the rise, so watch out.

Alert of the Week

Robocalls — don't you just hate those automated phone calls saying you've been selected for some kind of special offer, or even a prize?

News magazine *Time* warns that 95% of Americans got one of these calls in just the first six months of this year.

Although crooks can spoof a call, pretending it comes from another source, the best way of avoiding robocalls is still to refuse to pick up the phone if you don't recognize the number. If it's a genuine call, they'll leave a message.

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System Upgrade

My Linux computer system drive (SSD) was running out of space. The SSD was installed February 2015. The SSD is used as the root for Mint 17.3. I moved most of the files from my home folders to the data drive which gave me some breathing room while I ordered a new 1TB SSD.

Storage configuration was as follows; 1TB for Linux Mint 17, 4TB for data, and 6TB for backup. The SSD drive is a Kingston Hyper X 3K SSD, 240GB SATA drive (6Gb/s), model # SH103S3/240G. I ordered a SanDisk SSD Plus 960GB as the replacement for my 240GB SSD.

Items needed: New SSD USB3 SATA hard drive dock Clonezilla ISO CD (bootable)

NOTE: It is highly recommended you make a backup before proceeding, unless you know you can recover all your files.

My idea was to clone the old SSD to the new SSD with Clonezilla by booting the computer with a bootable CD of Clonezilla. It took a while to clone the system drive (installed in my midtower) to the new SSD in the drive dock. This worked just fine. Then I removed the old SSD and installed the new SSD.

The new SSD would not boot; it appeared to be a boot sector problem. Out came my bootable Boot Repair CD. Booted the computer with Boot Repair CD and ran their auto fix option. After it completed, my computer now displayed a boot menu and I was able to boot to Linux Mint 17.3.


Next, I ran Gparted on the new SSD to expand the partition to use the entire space. Everything is good to go.


