

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The Equifax Security Breach

By now the hack into Equifax's database should be common knowledge. Millions of consumers' most sensitive data was stolen.

Here are a few suggestions to help keep yourself as safe as possible under the circumstances.

First, sign up at **creditkarma.com** for their free monitoring service so that you're alerted when changes to your credit history occur. Again, this is a free service and will alert you by email when something changes.

Secondly, you should be accessing a copy of your credit report every year from the three credit bureaus to check for any errors. Every person is entitled to one free credit report each year from each credit bureau. To access the report, go to **annualcreditreport.com**. Although you are limited to one credit report per bureau per year, one strategy is to request a copy of one bureau's report, wait four months, then request a copy of the second bureau's report, wait four months, then request a copy of the third bureau's report. After that, repeat the process and you'll always have at least one relatively current credit report for free.

The third and most important thing to do is to freeze you credit reports at each of the three credit bureaus: Equifax, Trans Union and Experian. In Ohio, this will cost \$10 per bureau, but it is worth it in the long run.

A freeze will prevent creditors from accessing your credit report. Depending on the state where you live, a freeze may also prevent other companies from checking your credit when you apply for services such as cell phone or auto insurance. You will need to remember your PIN, and based on state law, you may have a waiting period when you wish to unfreeze your report, however, most of the time you can easily thaw your credit immediately online by logging in to the credit bureau's web site.

This will stop any new credit being opened in your name or any new lenders from checking your credit. The freeze process involves creating a PIN for each of the credit bureaus in case you want to thaw or remove the credit freeze at a later date. Without this PIN, no new credit can be opened, so make sure it is kept in a safe & secure place. A security freeze remains on your credit file until you remove it. You will need to plan ahead and contact any credit bureau with whom you place a freeze before applying for new credit.

Taking steps now to protect yourself is crucial, because while criminals may have your information, they may not decide to use it for years. So by freezing your credit and monitoring your financial accounts, you can minimize any potential damage that could come along down the road.

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More on Security

Continuing the discussion on security from last month's article, here are some more tips on privacy and security.

Try to keep the personal information shared on the Internet to a minimum.

When filling out forms for non-critical web pages or when signing up for newsletters or other free things, there is a good possibility that the requesting site only needs this information for advertising purposes. A site that needs your address because you will be getting something delivered or for entry into some contest, etc. will require your actual address. For a site that is asking for your address simply for marketing or to view something on a web page, you should try using a fake address.

Similarly, for marketing sites, who said you need to enter your real name or birth date? I have been using the same fake name, address and birthdate for over three decades when asked by companies that really don't need to know my true information.

Protect your privacy by revealing true personal information only to sites/companies that REALLY require them for legal, or medical reasons.

What about your email address? Do you only have one? Do you give it out to everyone? Protect your email address by signing up for another disposable email address that you can use on sites where you need to provide an address, but you don't care about any emails they may send. You could also use one of the temporary email services like mailinator.com or 10minutemail.com to sign up for some web site, get an email verification code, and then never have to worry about getting spammed by the company.

Email aliases are another way to keep your "true" email address private, but give out an email address to a site you don't trust. Most email providers will allow the creation of email aliases so that you can then define a rule/filter to send all email that comes to that address into the trash directly without having to view it. A good article on how to do this with Gmail is found in the article, **How to Use the Infinite Number of Email Addresses Gmail Gives You**. You can find other tutorials for other email providers by using your favorite search engine.

Last month's discussion brought up the subject of Security Questions for web sites. Another way to keep those answers secure is to use spaces or special characters when answering the questions on sites that allow the use of those characters (not all sites allow all special characters). For example, a security question that asks what your favorite color is will not have very many answers. In order to help thwart hackers who will try to break into accounts by guessing security questions, the strategic use of extra characters will help. If your favorite color is "red", then that answer is not very secure. However, if your answer is "r-e *d", then your answer is far more secure and harder to guess. Set up a rule that you remember that says "put a dash after the first character, then a space and an aster-

isk after the second character and then the rest of the answer" (for this particular example). So, using this example, if your favorite color is "yellow", you could follow that rule and answer, "y-e *llow". Again, make up your own rules to help keep your answers secure.

Do you make online purchases? Are you concerned about your credit card number getting stolen? Virtual Credit Cards help to limit your exposure to this theft.

Virtual Credit Cards are temporary credit card numbers tied to your credit card account. These numbers are different than your physical card number and are typically valid for only one merchant for each number. Unfortunately, not all banks offer Virtual Credit Cards. Discover, Citibank and Bank of America are three credit card issuers who do this. There may be more.

When using virtual credit cards, you would typically login to your credit card's web page and choose the option on the web page typically under the Security section. LCCUG gave a presentation on this topic many years ago which was recorded as a video which can be downloaded and played on your computer. The video can be found on lccug.com/movies.

Genealogy SIG Report The Anatomy of a Death Certificate

Computer Users of Erie By Harold D. Kelley, SIG Leader June 2017 issue, Horizon newsletter - News and Information to expand your computing Horizons

Sue Mueller, Contributor, Family Grave, presented a program entitled "The Anatomy of a Death Certificate." She provided the SIG members with a handout, "Find Death Certificates Online (Free)." It is included, with Sue's permission, at the end of this meeting's summary.

Sue explained that the new death certificates don't have as much information on them as the old ones. However, since it is 50 years before you can obtain death certificates that are available to the public, most of the ones we see will be very interesting because they are older.

Different states handle death certificates differently, but in Pennsylvania, you can get them free. Overall, the best site to use for various states, is the one listed second on the handout sheet. When you have to pay a fee for a death certificate, the best site is the one listed last on the handout sheet.

On a death certificate, you can get **death facts**, **personal facts**, **genealogical information**, what happens to the body, **medical and health information** such as the cause of death, and what contributed to the death and how long it had been going on.

Concerning **death facts**, those who are using either Family Tree Maker or Ancestry.com, not all the information on the death certificate is merged into those programs. There is some good information that doesn't get merged. The only things that are merged are the name, the city or town and county of birth and the death. The only thing you are guaranteed to get accurately is where the person died.

On a death certificate, the parents' names will be there, including the mother's maiden name, if the informant providing the information knows it. Sometimes they write "unk" for unknown. What is merged

into Family Tree Maker is how it is indexed. Death facts include the deceased's name, where he/she died, the specific location of death, such as a hospital, state hospital or alms house. If a person dies in a hospital, state hospital or alms house, some information may not be accurate, because the informant may not be knowledgeable, but in these cases, the medical information and cause of death are likely to be accurate.

You also get **personal information** on a death certificate. If the deceased is a family member, the live people, if they are family giving the information, are upset, so if they know the information, they may not get it right, or they may not even know the information, in which case they have no hope of getting it right. For example, they may not know the state in which the person was born.

Sue said she will sometimes check the census data to check whether the person was born in Ohio or Pennsylvania, for example. The personal information also includes whether the person was married, divorced, single or widowed, place of residence and occupation. Social Security numbers didn't come into play until the late 1930's, so someone born after that may have a number listed. It is usually asked if the person served in the military. Since many of these facts would not be merged into Family Tree Maker or Ancestry.com, one would have to enter them manually into Facts in their program.

What kind of **genealogical information** can you get on a death certificate? Included is the father's name and sometime where he was born, and sometimes the town or city, not just the state. The mother's name and maiden name is asked for, and often where she was born. The full name of the spouse, and if the spouse is still living, is asked for; this can be important for searching for more information. It is not asked whether or how the informant is related to the deceased.

The death certificate is created right away. The funeral home obtains the number of copies of the death certificate that will be required. The certificate will also have the place of burial and sometimes the name of the cemetery. It will tell whether the dispersal of the body is by cremation or burial. It is noted if the body is taken out of state. The funeral home will be listed as well as the coroner.

With regard to **medical and health information**, the death certificate will give the cause of death, contributory causes, how long the person was sick, name of the attending doctor and the name of the doctor who pronounced the death.

Concerning the cause of death, in addition to what is written on the death certificate, there is an ICD code

(International Classification of Diseases) which identifies the cause of death. It is maintained and updated by the World Health Organization regularly. It was developed in the late 1880's. We started using it in 1898. One should always check out the revision to the ICD code right before the death date to be sure to get the most updated information. If the written cause of death is difficult to read, one should go with the ICD code given on the death certificate. The address for the ICD information is:

http://www.wolfbane.com/icd/index.html. The information is free and is intended to be used universally.

For those using Ancestry.com and Family tree Maker, there are some facts that will not be merged into Family Tree Maker, such as the name of the informant, the deceased's occupation and the cause of death. Where the burial is will be noted, but not the name of the cemetery. The name of parents may be given, if still living; this information could be important for genealogical purposes. Facts that are not merged into Family Tree Maker will have to be put into FTM by hand, using the FTM protocol for adding facts.
