Who's Watching You?

More Internet users are relying on VPNs – apps called Virtual Private Networks, that keep your Internet activity from prying eyes – than ever before. As more of us pay our credit card bills online, buy tickets from online travel agencies, and read our email, it's clear online privacy is getting much more attention.

Most Americans are unaware that in 2017, Congress passed, and the president signed a bill trashing an F.C.C. rule.

That rule would have required Internet providers to get permission from customers before selling their web browsing history and other private information to advertisers, ad agencies and others.

Instead, Internet providers are free to sell your personal data, despite your objections. Isn't this backwards? Shouldn't you be able to decide who sees your browsing habits, your email, the banks with whom you do business, and your Social Security number?

Personal information such as which illnesses you've searched in a web browser, where you bank, where you shop, and potentially even where your child or grandchild goes to school can now be accessed by the company you pay for Internet service.

To prevent this, more and more of us are paying for VPNs to keep prying eyes away. The COVID-19 pandemic is having a major impact on VPN use.

"When the pandemic hit in 2020, VPN demand skyrocketed, driven by the increased use of internet-based services at home, and the evolution of remote work. During the first two weeks between March 8th and March 22nd alone, VPN usage in the USA increased a massive 124%," reports Findstack.

A blog called The Cornwall Seeker writes, "A decade ago, only a third of Americans and 20% of the people in the U.K. knew what a VPN was. Now, 68% of all adults in the U.S. use a VPN according to security.org."

A just-released poll by Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research and Meritalk re-

veals that most Americans believe their personal online information is not at all secure.

Most polled believe social media activity such as Facebook, Twitter or Instagram is not very or not at all secure. 50% say private text conversations lack privacy.

In addition, many are not satisfied with the federal government's total lack of action. Nearly 75% of those polled support establishing national standards for how companies can collect, process and share personal data.

The Associated Press quotes Sarah Blick, a professor of medieval art history at Kenyon College in Gambier, Ohio, northeast of Columbus as saying, "I feel there is little to no security whatsoever."

Earlier this year, the college's human resources department told Blick that someone fraudulently applied for unemployment insurance benefits in her name. As we spoke about during the September Tech Night Zoom session, VPNs can keep your online activity secure – but only if you use them on all of your Internet devices.

If you missed Tech Night, check out A Beginner's Guide to Understanding VPNs.

If you're ready to choose a VPN, see what Top10VPN considers its best VPN services. Tom's Guide lists its top choices in the best VPNs.

Because so many Americans (and Internet users all over the world) are currently considering a VPN, it's a very competitive market.

As I mentioned during Tech Night if you can afford it, you can get better pricing if, rather than buying a VPN for six months or one year, you pay for a twoor three-year period.

What To Look For In a VPN

Security & Privacy: As one website says, "A VPN is only as good as its ability to keep you and your data safe."

Speed: Since a VPN is rerouting your Internet connection through its own private servers, if there aren't enough servers, your speed can suffer. The best VPNs have vast networks all over the world. If you cannot connect to one server because too many people are connected at the same time, you simply choose another server.

Ease of Use & Customer Support: It should be as simple as moving a slider button on your phone or double clicking a tab on your Mac or PC to activate a VPN. If you have trouble with a VPN – or questions – the company needs to provide customer support. Period.

Performance & Server Locations: The more servers there are, the better chances you have to connect to your VPN if there's congestion. If you cannot connect to a server closest to you, then there should be one fairly close by. (Connecting to a VPN server in St. Louis or Virginia rather than St. Croix or Germany or Australia will typically give you faster Internet speed from your computer, phone, or iPad in Kentucky.)

Price: Find a VPN that you can afford. Avoid free VPNs. Many of them generate revenue by displaying plenty of ads. So, as you're trying to use the Internet, you're constantly disrupted by ads. Free VPNs often have few servers, and it might be a challenge to find one located near you. What you might not know is that many free VPNs use your computer's processing power when it's not in use. In addition, your activity might be tracked, your browsing details may be sold, and your Internet connection is often slow. Also, it's been discovered that China owns a number of free VPNs. Do you really want your personal Internet data going to Chinese authorities?

No Logging: The best VPNs will not track your web browser visits, your email, your social media usage, or other Internet activity. VPNs that do track your activity usually have one goal in mind: Making money. They want to sell your personal data.

"One quarter of all Internet users have accessed a VPN in the last month," wrote Rob Mardisalu on the thebestypn.com website in January 2020.

Here's a breakdown by device:

Desktop: 17% (had used a VPN in the last month as of Jan. 2020.) Mobile: 15%

Tablet: 7% For some, using a VPN was as common as washing their hands. bestvpn.com reports in early 2020, 35% of desktop computer users and 42% of mobile users (phones, laptops, iPads) had used a VPN every day.

VPN Users by Age (source: thebestvpn.com) 55-64 years old: 4%

45-54: 9%

35-44: 19% 25-34: 33%

16-24: 35%

The Asia-Pacific region has the highest number of VPN users (30%), while North America and Europe lag with far fewer VPN users (17%).

It turns out retaining anonymity (and keeping personal data private) is the strongest motivator to use a VPN in: the USA, Sweden, Canada, France, Japan, Germany, and South Africa. In other countries, folks use VPNs to stream TV shows and movies that have not yet been released or are off limits in those regions. In China and Russia, reporters use VPNs to get around repressive, dictatorial Internet restrictions.

WATCH OUT FOR THESE 5 UKRAINE SCAMS THAT COULD BE ON THEIR WAY HERE: INTERNET SCAM-BUSTERS #1,003

The military situation in Ukraine is moving quickly -- and so are crooks using the name of the country to pull off scams.

Fraudsters will twist the name of Ukraine into well-known scam disguises in the coming weeks.

UKRAINE CONFLICT SCAMS TARGET AMERICANS

The conflict in Ukraine may seem a long way from your doorstep but you can be sure, in at least one way, your security is likely to be threatened: by scammers!

Experience from past conflicts tells us what Ukraine scams are waiting to snare us, and they won't necessarily come from Eastern Europe.

Here are five tricks that will likely target Americans in the coming weeks -- even if there are serious moves toward peace.

DISTRESSED FRIENDS OR RELATIVES

This long-established scam is perfectly tailored toward the situation in Ukraine right now.

Victims receive a message by phone, text or email, seemingly from someone they know, who will say they're trapped in the war zone and urgently need money to escape.

They will ask for the money to be sent by one of the wiring services because that's exactly how you might send cash in such a dire situation.

Usually, the crooks will phone, using a vague introduction like "It's me" in hopes the victim will guess the name of someone they know. Then they'll spin a story about being on a business trip or vacation in Ukraine when they got

trapped.

More Scam Reports: FTC Plans Fall Summit to Tackle Robocalls

If this happens to you, always ask the name of the caller rather than giving them clues and then check on the real location of that person via friends or relatives.

Even if you can't confirm their whereabouts, it's almost certainly a scam. If you wire money, you'll never see it again.

WAR VICTIM CHARITIES

Scammers set up fake websites claiming to be involved in helping Ukrainian victims of the battles. This is exactly what happened during the conflict in Syria.

Social media sites like Facebook are their favorite hunting grounds.

Often, scam charities use realistic sounding names and feature dramatic photos from war zones. They may want you to wire cash or use cybercurrency to donate, both of which are untraceable after the money is sent.

Or they may ask you to pay by credit card and then use your card details for identity theft, which they'll either sell or max out.

The best way to avoid Ukraine charity scams is to contribute only to established, reputable charities like the Red Cross. Even then, you need to be sure you're dealing with the genuine organization by searching online for their website and starting from there.

Specifically for kids affected by the conflict, visit Charitable Foundation Voices of Children. Also check out this report from *Newsweek*: How to Help the People of Ukraine.

Watch out too for street and shopping mall collectors with donation buckets or boxes. It's next to impossible to know if they're genuine when they stop you, unless you know the collector personally.

More Scam Reports: Millennials Face Greatest Risk of Being Scammed

FAKE NEWS

Perpetrators use dramatic untrue stories, "doctored" videos and emotional photos to support whatever their ulterior aim is.

They may be inspired by political motives, or just luring victims to fake websites to download malware.

It's so easy to fake news and images these days and crooks know the more sensational the story, the more likely you are to follow links or repost what you see.

Avoid clicking on links in these reports and definitely never download "video viewers" or other apps a site says you need.

And don't forward stories without checking them online, by doing a search to see if other sources are reporting the same thing. If they're not, it's likely fake.

BRIDAL CANDIDATES

Ukraine is one of the most common locations for so-called mail-order brides, women looking for dating and marriage partners in the US.

Not surprisingly, Ukraine is also a hotbed for online bridal scams in which the crooks create a convincing backstory and then ask victims to send money for them to fly. They usually keep their victims on the hook for as long as possible with repeated requests for more money.

It's highly likely that these scam "brides" -- who may really be anywhere in the world -- will use the explanation of an urgent need to escape the Ukrainian conflict.

This gives them two advantages -- a plausible excuse and the need to pressure victims into taking urgent action before they have time to thoroughly investigate.

Overseas bridal sites are dubious at best. You'll always be asked to pay a fee, which you'll never get back, so we advise against using them unless you're 100 percent certain they're legit. Even then, never offer to pay airfares or outrageous fees.

More Scam Reports: Can You Trust That Label -- Or Does It Hide a Food Scam?

Legit bridal agencies charge between \$2,000 and \$4,000 but rip-offs, even by genuine agencies, can go as high as \$30,000.

NIGERIAN SCAMS IN UKRAINE

Really? Yes, this scam, which began in and still operates from Nigeria and other African countries, involves email requests, often from a fake government official or businessperson.

Messages say that the purported sender is a high-ranking person with access to millions of dollars (or hryvnia, the Ukrainian currency) that they'll split with you if you help them smuggle it out of the country.

A military conflict in a region where corruption is not unusual provides the ideal scenario for spinning this kind of spoof story.

Victims are asked to pay for all types of services, supposed "bribes," and flight tickets to get their hands on the money which, of course, never arrives.

Remarkably, this scam is still going despite widespread publicity. The simple rule (apart from not breaking the law!) is never to pay to receive money.

FINAL WORDS

Depending on the direction this conflict takes, Ukrainian versions of other well-known scams will likely emerge in the coming weeks. The best policy is that when you see or hear the word "Ukraine," beware and think carefully before acting.

Why Do an Image Backup If I Can Factory Reset?

Factory reset is a great option to have, but it doesn't cover all the scenarios a full image backup does.

I'm getting ready to set up my new laptop. Before I start, I'm wondering why do an Image Backup when there is the factory reset built in? Is there any good reason?

Oh my *yes*.

I can think of at least two or three important scenarios a factory reset would miss *completely*.

Don't get me wrong, a factory reset can be useful, and it's easier than ever in recent versions of Windows. But it's not a solution to every problem.

Image backup vs. factory reset

- An image backup will restore everything after a **hard disk failure**. A factory reset cannot.
- An image backup can be used to restore your **data**. A factory reset cannot.
- An image backup guarantees **malware** can be removed completely. A factory reset cannot.

Hard disk failure

The single most important reason you want to always have an image backup on hand is this: your hard

disk can die.

In fact, your hard disk can die at any time, without warning, destroying everything stored on it. Yes, sometimes data can be recovered, but you can't know that beforehand.

And guess where the copy of Windows used for a factory reset is stored? On your hard disk. If you can't reboot your machine because the hard disk has died, you can't even access the factory reset option.

Yes, you could boot from installation media and reset your PC that way — presumably installing it on a replacement hard disk. But *everything* on your PC will have been lost. A reset in this disaster scenario will only get you so far: a working copy of Windows, and nothing else.

Restoring from an image backup will restore everything to the state it was in at the time the backup was created.

Data loss

Factory reset, aka "Reset this PC", has the option to reinstall Windows as best it can without removing your data. That's great, assuming your data is still there.

What if it's not?

A factory reset will not restore your data.

It could be as simple as accidentally deleting something you shouldn't have. It could be as potentially disastrous as the sudden and complete hard disk failure we've been talking about. The bottom line is that a factory reset only restores Windows itself. It will not recover software you've installed yourself, and it will not recover your data.

An image backup, by definition, contains everything: Windows, your installed programs, your data, and everything else you might not even think of to restore.

Malware

Malware is tricky. Most of the time, a factory reset will remove all currently active malware.

There are at least two scenarios where a factory reset may not help and may even give you a false sense of security:

- The malware is not in Windows itself, but one of your installed applications or other software. A factory reset may not remove these applications.
- The malware arrived via data files, which, if left in place by a factory reset remain ready to re-infect your machine the moment you use them.

Restoring to a backup image taken prior to the malware's arrival, on the other hand, is the fastest and most complete way to ensure that the malware has been removed.

Do this

Know that factory reset exists. It's a great way to address some problems, like a misbehaving system. But take image backups regularly anyway. I prefer monthly full plus daily incremental, but no matter what approach you take, make sure you're taking *some* approach.

The best scenario to run through your mind is to ask yourself what you would do if your hard disk suddenly died. Would you be able to recover, and how? If you have an image backup, the answer is "Yes" and "Pretty easily."

Where to Get E-Books

A perennial challenge is to find suitable gifts for friends and family. Books have always been a popular choice. Now, with the maturing of the electronic book (e-book) format and industry, it should be easier than ever to find just the right title, purchase it and email a link for your giftee to use to access and read the book. Of course, things aren't so simple in practice, so you may want to read on.

E-book formats

There are two main formats: Amazon Kindle and E-Pub. There are hardware and software readers for each. Both formats support digital rights management (copy protection) so that the purchaser of a book can't share it with more than a few others. Amazon mainly uses the Kindle format. E-Pub is used by Barnes and Noble and Kobo and for many self-published books. Adobe PDF and HTML are also often used for e-books. Apple's iBook format is a variation of E-Pub.

When buying an e-book, it's important to know what format it is in so you can be sure your reader device or program can read the book. A common problem for owners of Amazon's Kindle or Fire tablets is that they do not support the E-Pub format. The Amazon app store does not offer an E-Pub reader app. It's possible to "jailbreak" a Kindle or Fire tablet so that it can install Android apps from the Google play store, including Adobe's Digital Editions E-Pub reader. But that's a topic for another day.

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Let's look at a few of them in more depth.

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If you subscribe to Amazon Prime, you have access to an extensive collection of e-books at no charge via the Prime Reading service. In addition, you can have free access to up to ten e-books for as long as you wish. Then, return or buy one of the ten you have when you want another.

The Amazon Fire HD 10 tablet with 32 GB of storage lists for \$100.

Barnes and Noble

Barnes and Noble sells books in "Nook book" (E-Pub) format and paperback and hardcover. B&N also sells a family of Nook reader tablets and has a free reader app. In addition, you can set up an account on B&N and enjoy special pricing, free e-books, and other perks.

See the screenshot below to get a sense of their online store. The search window is very smart.

The Nook book reader is a 10-inch Android tablet (made by Lenovo) with 32 GB of storage, listing at \$130. It has full access to the Google Play Store apps. This would include the free Amazon Kindle Reader app for Android. So, a Nook reader tablet could double as a Kindle Reader, allowing you to shop for books in either Nook or Kindle format.

Project Gutenberg was founded by Michael Hart, who invented e-books in 1971. Its website claims to have 60,000 titles in its library. All these titles are completely free. Most are "classics" that are out of copyright. For example, I searched for Albert Einstein and found an English translation of his Special and General Relativity expositions.

I tried downloading a copy of Herman Melville's "Moby Dick" in Kindle format and read it using the free Calibre book reader app on my PC. But unfortunately, the Amazon Kindle Reader app wasn't able to open the book.

Las Vegas Clark County Public Library

The Las Vegas Clark County Library District website offers a rich collection of e-books and other e-media that you can borrow for up to 21 days. The only requirement is a library card number and an associated PIN. For APCUG readers, your public library very likely offers comparable services.
